

Karen J. Homer-Brown Pleasure Judge

Karen's career began with health sciences and continued to auctioneering and onto all aspects of equine activities. Today she enjoys membership and life memberships with associations representing many breeds including Morgan, Arabian, Hackney, Miniature Horse, Saddlebred, Shetland, Andalusian and Lusitano.

Her equine career began in 1958 and at the age of 11 won the Saddle Seat Equitation Championship at the Mid-Atlantic Regional Morgan Horse Show. Working either as a groom, conditioner, trainer or riding



instructor Karen went on to exhibit horses in the United States and Canada, including Arabians, Hackney Horses and Ponies, Morgans, National Show Horses, Saddlebreds and Carriage and Coaching Horses; many of which were national and international champions. In addition to judging, Karen has been Ringmaster for many competitions for the past 15 years. In 2013, she was the show Manager (onsite) for the CAA Carriage Festival 2013.

Karen is best recognized for her judging activities. Having professionally judged 15 –25 shows a year since the age of 16 and acquiring her first AHSA/USEF license at age 21. Today she holds 14 licenses from four sanctioned organizations in the United States. Known internationally for conducting seminars and judging clinics she has recently worked with Equine Canada (EC) testing trainers/instructors for certification to train horses and give riding lessons.

In 2004, Karen was awarded Horse Woman of the Year, from the American Morgan Horse Association and in 2012, the Pinto Horse Association of America Judge's Hall of Fame. In 2017, Karen received a 40-year Judge's pin from USEF and in 2018 received a 40-year honor of judging Morgans from the American Morgan Horse Association.

Minta Winn Judge - Cone and Dressage

Minta Winn's career is built on either competing or producing top carriage driving turnouts for clients in all disciplines of the sport. Training horses, ponies and humans in all disciplines of carriage driving from young drivers through to silver surfers then opening doors for disabled drivers to compete on level playing par.

Successes include winning the Supreme Harness Horse of the Year, the British Driving Society Supreme Championships, and the Nation Championships. After winning the Royal Windsor Horse Show, Concourse D'Elegance two years running she prepared the same equines to compete at National and International CDE events. In 2008 Minta took part in writing a book with Sally Taylor titled Learn to Carriage Drive that provides explanations of how to and what to look for, has now become one of the resources for learning to drive. In 2018, she stepped up to the Single Horse Chef d'Equipe position as well as the Chef d'Equipe for Horse Pairs competing in Germany later in 2019. Currently the focus is on teaching carriage driving and working in her leather workshop that began some 40 years previous in Ireland.

Laid back in her delivering of pure pleasure driving provides a large clientele an opportunity to drive regularly just to feel good and enjoy interaction with horses.

DESCRIPTION of GAITS

WALK

A free, regular and unconstrained walk of moderate extension is ideal. The animal should walk energetically but calmly with even and determined steps; four beat gait.

SLOW TROT

A slow, balanced trot on a lighter rein, where the animal's step is shorter and lighter than in faster gaits. Animal should show willingness to be driven on the bit while maintaining a steady cadence.

WORKING TROT

Pace between slow and strong trot, animal more rounded than in a strong trot. Animals go forward freely and straight while remaining balanced and unconstrained on a taut but light rein. Steps as even as possible with the hind feet touching the ground in footprints of the fore feet. Gait shows animals' suppleness and balance.

STRONG TROT

Clear but not excessive increase in speed with lengthening of stride and maintenance of balance. Light contact with lateral flexion on turns should occur. Excessive speed is penalized. Call for gait is "TROT ON".

HALT

Turnout brought to a complete square stop without veering or abruptness. At halt, the animal is to remain attentive, motionless and straight with weight evenly on all four legs.

REIN BACK

Backward movement where legs raised and set down simultaneously in diagonal pairs with hind legs in line. Back at least four steps with quiet aids, head flexed and straight, pushing back in a straight line. After back the animal will then move forward willingly to the former position and perform a halt.

A class where entries are judged primarily on performance and quality of turnout. Shown both ways of ring at a walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. Equine to stand quietly and rein back if asked. Judged 70% on condition, fit and appropriateness of harness and vehicle, neatness and appropriateness of attire and overall impression; 30% on performance and way of going.

A class where entries are judged primarily on suitability of equine to provide a pleasant drive. Shown both ways of ring at walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. To stand quietly on the rail and in line and to rein back. Turnout may be chosen for individual work. Judged 70% on equine performance, manners and way of going; 20% on condition and fit of harness; 10% on neatness of attire.

A class where entries are judged primarily on ability and skill of the driver. Should be shown both ways of the ring at a walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. Drivers must rein back. Drivers may be chosen for individual work at any gait as requested by the judge and may be asked to execute specific tests. Either one or two-handed driving is acceptable with elbows and arms close to the body. The driver should have a steady, enabling hand and a consistent feel of the equine's mouth. Judged 75% on handling of reins and whip, control, posture and overall driver impression; 25% on condition of harness and vehicle and neatness of attire. Ribbons 1 to 5.

A timed event to be driven over a prescribed course of obstacles consisting of cones and balls. The number of obstacles is to be proportionate to the size of the driving arena and is not to exceed 20 obstacles. After passing through the start marker, the driver shall proceed through each obstacle in order to the designated finish marker. Course faults are assessed as penalty seconds and are added to the driver's elapsed time. Placings are determined on a low total time basis. Cantering is not allowed. Ribbons 1 to 5.

To be driven over a prescribed course of natural or artificial obstacles that have been designed to simulate those that might be encountered on a country drive. Obstacles will be clearly numbered. Spotters will be positioned throughout the course to observe and record course violations and also ensure safety during the course. NO TIMING DEVICES TO BE USED ON COURSE (INCLUDES STOPWATCHES AND WATCHES). The driver begins by passing through the start markers and proceeding through each obstacle in order. The turnout must keep within the limits of the designated course markers and proceed until passing through the designated finish markers. An ideal time for each division to drive the course will be determined prior to the event. Time will be used to decide ties for those with equal fault totals. Cantering is not allowed. Ribbons 1 to 5.

Drive and Ride

Class 55

The entry can use the same person in both sections or by one in the drive and another in the ride section. The turnout is first shown in the drive portion to a suitable pleasure driving vehicle both ways of the arena at a walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. To stand quietly and rein back. The turnout is then to leave the arena and prepare for the ride portion of the class.

Under saddle the entry shows both ways of the arena at a walk, trot and canter. To stand quietly and to rein back. To be judged 50% on performance, manners, way of going and suitability in harness; 50% on performance, manners and way of going under saddle.

Ribbons 1 to 5.

Hackney Horse or Pony Driven for Pleasure Class Class 56

Shown in a two or four wheeled pleasure vehicle (viceroy not permitted). Must have a natural mane and tail. Checks are optional but if used the equine must remain checked. To be shown both ways of the ring at a trot, working trot, walk and stand quiet. Animals may be asked to reverse. Entry will be judged on overall presentation and suitability of driver. No appointments. Ribbons 1 to 5

CLASS DESCRIPTIONS and CONDITIONS (continued)

Costume Class

Class 57

An entertaining class open to all competitors. Components of the costume may involve the driver, carriage and/or equine partners. The costume should be tasteful and entertaining to both the judge and spectators. The turnout will be shown both ways of the ring at a walk and working trot and then line up and stand quietly. Individual inspection will be carried out. Judged 70% on costume, 30% on manners and way of going.

Hackney Horse or Pony in Fine Harness Class

Class 58

Shown in a two or four-wheeled vehicle. Must have a natural tail, docked tail or 'appear to be docked' tail. Mane to be braided or 'appear braided'. To be shown both ways of the ring at park pace and show your horse. Judged on manners, performance and overall presentation.

Ribbons 1 to 5.

Carriage Dog Class

Class 59

Judged for suitability of dog to serve as a companion and only one dog is allowed on the vehicle. Judged both ways of ring at a walk, slow trot and working trot. Dog must be standing, lying down or seated on the vehicle and not running behind, beside or at axle of vehicle. Dog must not be led on the ground from the vehicle or tied to vehicle, driver or passenger. Driver should not hold dog and dog must not interfere with driver in any way. Judged 60% on suitability of dog to serve as companion, 30% on performance, manner and way of going of equine and 10% on overall impression of turnout including dog.

Winners Take All Scurry

Class 60

To be driven over a course of 10 un-numbered obstacles consisting of cones and balls. After passing through the start markers from either direction, the driver then proceeds through each obstacle from any direction in any order. On completion of the course the driver MUST pass through the finish markers from either direction. Time will be taken at the finish marker. Refusals and run outs will not be penalized. Course faults will be scored as penalty seconds and added to the driver's elapsed time. The winner will be determined on a low total time basis. Ties for first place will be broken by a drive-off. CANTERING IS ALLOWED IN THIS CLASS. The entry fees from all competitors in this class will be awarded: 1st place 50%, 2nd place 30%, 3rd place 20%.

No ribbons will be given for those that place in this class.

THE GREAT LAKES CARRIAGE CLASSIC 2019 CLASS DESCRIPTIONS and CONDITIONS (continued)

Concours D'Elegance Class 61 - entry fee not required

The essence of this competition is the word "Elegance". The winner will be the turnout that in the opinion of the judges presents the most elegant effect throughout the whole show. The judges will assess: vehicle, harness, appointments, equine, driver, passenger, groom, etc., but the most important is the overall impression. Period costumes are definitely prohibited. Performance is not judged unless it detracts from the elegance of the turnout. Ribbon and award to recipient.

Red Light/Green Light Class 62

This class was created to encourage young people to participate in carriage driving. Driven over a cones course any driver/animal combination may be used as long as the turnout carries the number of that specific Red Light / Green Light **Passenger/Competitor** (referred to as **P/C** in these rules). The same driver/animal can be used more than once with different P/C entries. **Seven Rules for Competing:**1. Driver to be a TCCA member with adequate liability insurance. **2.** Junior P/C to wear a helmet. **3.** P/C directs the driver over a course of numbered obstacles and stop signs. **4.** P/C to call the course out to the driver who then follows their instructions. **5.** Obstacles to be driven in order and when a stop sign is encountered the P/C is to instruct the driver to stop. **6.** At each stop sign a question will be asked based on basic driving information. **7.** If the P/C answers correctly the turnout can proceed, otherwise the turnout is to wait out a 10-second penalty. The P/C with the lowest time on their course wins the class. Ribbons for participants.

Hackney Horse or Pony Gig Class Class 63

To be driven by an adult 18 years or older. Checks optional but if checked the animal must remain checked. Must have a natural tail, docked tail or 'appear to be docked' tail. Mane to be braided or 'appear braided'. To be shown both ways of the ring at a trot, smart trot, walk and stand quietly. Animals may be asked to reverse. Judged on manners, way of going and overall presentation. No appointments.

FEATURED BREED NORWEGIAN FJORD HORSE

(Norwegian: fjordhest)

HISTORY – A relatively small but very strong horse breed from the mountainous regions of western Norway. It is an agile breed of light draught horse build. All Fjord horses are dun in colour, with five variations in shade recognised in the breed standard. The Norwegian Fjord horse often reminds people of a horse in a cave painting with its upright mane and compact body. In fact, it is the world's oldest and purest domesticated breed. Archeological evidence shows it was domesticated at least 2000 years ago. It was the Fjord the Vikings relied on to carry them into battle and its steadfast nature endures to this day. The Fjord evolved in Western Norway, a land of sheer rock and steep cliffs which drop straight to the ocean.

VERSATILE - One of the world's oldest breeds, it has been used for hundreds of years as a farm horse in Norway, and in modern times is popular for its generally good temperament. It is used both as a harness horse and under saddle.



FEATURED BREED (continued) NORWEGIAN FJORD HORSE (Norwegian: fjordhest)

CHARACTERISTICS - The Fjord horse has a distinct appearance. The breed's conformation differs from many other breeds in that it is a blend of draught horse muscling and bone, with smaller size and greater agility. It has a strong, arched neck, sturdy legs and good feet, and a compact, muscular body. The head is medium-sized and well defined with a broad, flat forehead and a straight or slightly dished face, with small ears and large eyes. Despite its small size, the breed is fully capable of carrying an adult human and pulling heavy loads. The hair coat becomes particularly heavy and thick in the winter. There is no upper or lower limit for height set for the breed, but heights between 135 and 150 cm (13.1 and 14.3 hands; 53 and 59 inches) at the withers are recommended. The weight normally ranges from 400 to 500 kilograms (880 to 1,100 lb). Though some individuals may fall under the traditional cut off between horses and ponies, the Fjord horse is considered a horse, regardless of height.

PJ Crowley and Tara Milizano-Crowley have been involved in carriage driving for many years. Located in Zionsville, PA they have been involved in the purchase, training and rehabilitation of driving horses and the training of countless drivers. Both have competed successfully throughout NA and have a special fondness for the Friesian Horse. The award is given to the Friesian or Friesian Cross that has the highest cumulative score at the GLCC. Class 60 is not included in scoring.

THE GREAT LAKES CARRIAGE CLASSIC 2019 GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Tri-Country Carriage Association, Ancaster Agricultural Society, The GLCC Show Committee, Officials and any property owners of any such land which may be used for any aspect of the Competition will not be responsible for any claim resulting from injury or injuries to any person, horse/pony or loss or damage to property incurred on the show grounds, staging/stabling area or property used during the competition. In all situations the whip assumes responsibility and liability for any injury or damage to him/herself, to groom/s, and or passenger/s riding with them in the vehicle. All persons riding on the vehicle from time of arrival to departure MUST sign a waiver and put it on file with the Show Secretary. A parent or guardian must sign the waiver if the competitor is under 19 years of age.
- 2. Entry fee is \$150 for a division. A division is made up of five classes: Pleasure Turnout, Pleasure Working, Reinsmanship, Cones and Pleasure Cross Country Obstacle. The Hackney Division is \$90 and made up of three classes: pleasure, fine harness and gig. The fee is \$35 per class for a whip who signs up for individual classes. The fee for the dressage tests is \$40. The Winners Take All Scurry Class, Drive and Ride, Costume and Carriage Dog Class have an entry fee of \$25. Red Light / Green Light is \$15. Exhibitors may do two different dressage tests if time allows (please indicate first preference on entry form). There is no entry fee for the Concours d'Elegance Class.
- 3. Entries received before the closure date of Monday the 5th of August will be entered in a draw for a gift basket. This basket will be presented to the draw winners at registration with the Show Secretary. Late entries will be taken from closure up to the day of the show with a \$50 penalty fee.
- 4. In the case of an exhibitor being entered and not exhibiting, the entry fees will be forfeited unless a veterinary or doctor certificate is presented to the Show Secretary prior to the start of the show. Stall fees are NOT REFUNDABLE.
- 5. Any questions or disputes should be referred to the Technical Delegate for a ruling or decision. Should a competitor wish to protest the TD's ruling, he/she may do so at the time such decision is made by filing a formal protest in writing with the Competition Appeals Committee. A \$100 fee must be submitted to the Show Secretary to activate a Protest Hearing by the Committee that is chaired by the Technical Delegate. The ruling of the Appeal Committee is to be rendered within 24 hours of the protest filing or prior to the presentation of Championship Awards. No protest will be heard after the close of the show. The \$100 filing fee will be returned to the competitor if a decision is rendered in favour of the competitor.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS (continued)

- 6. The Show Committee reserves the right to combine or cancel classes if there are less than three entries received in any of the listed classes. The Committee also reserves the right to split any class in the interest of safety and if the number of entries warrant such action.
- 7. Ties for Champion placings will be broken by the competitors' placing in the Turnout Class of that Division unless the two entries are owned by the same person and in this case the owner may designate the order of finish.
- 8. Outside assistance is forbidden unless directed by the judge.
- All animals must be serviceably sound and not show evidence of lameness, broken wind, physical distress or impairment of vision in both eyes.
- 10. It is the competitor's responsibility to be certain that all harness and vehicles are in good repair. No competitor will be allowed to continue in a class if in the opinion of the Judge, any part of the turnout has become dangerous or unsafe.
- 11. There shall be no schooling or walking of an equine over any portion of the cones or obstacle courses. While walking the course competitors shall not move an obstacle or part thereof in any way.
- 12. All entries must have a number before class entry. If an equine, whip or vehicle changes in a divisional class a new number is required. A different vehicle may be used for the dressage classes and specialty classes (except the Red Light / Green Light) without a change of number as long as the whip and equines remain the same. The numbers are available at the Secretary's Office once all fees have been paid.
- **13.** Wire wheeled vehicles and vehicles with pneumatic tires are allowed in the Utility Division without prior approval. For all other classes and divisions such vehicles must get PRIOR approval to show in such classes. Please contact Jean McLean at <a href="mailto:mcleac.google.co.co.google.co.google.
- 14. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHOULD A BRIDLE BE REMOVED FROM AN ANIMAL WHILE IT IS STILL PUT TO A VEHICLE. While put to, no animal should be left unattended and if this is done it will result in ELIMINATION.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS (continued)

- Cantering is not allowed in any class except the Winners Take all Scurry Class.
- **16.** For a non-showing equine a fee of \$50 is be paid and the animal is to wear its number at all times while on the show grounds.
- 17. It is the responsibility of the whip to be on time for classes. At the discretion of the Technical Delegate the entrance gate will be closed to late arrivals or temporarily held open if the whip notifies the Show Secretary prior to the class that there will be a conflict.
- **18.** When a driver is cross entering, their entry must be received by the closure date. No late cross entries will be accepted.
- **19.** For breed specific classes and awards documentation / registration papers for the equine is required and must be submitted with the entry.
- **20.** Wheel measurements must be recorded prior to the cones classes.
- **21.** All whips must be members of Tri-County Carriage Association. Membership fees: Individuals \$30; Family \$35; Junior \$20.
- **22.** All whips are responsible to ensure that adequate and current liability insurance coverage is in place prior to registering in the GLCC Show. (This is at the determination of each Whip)
- **23.** The GLCC Show Committee reserves to itself the right to decline any entry and to return any entry fee before or during the competition without being liable for compensation.
- **24.** Juniors are defined as being less than 21 years of age as of January 1st, 2019. Juniors must wear a properly fastened approved helmet at all times on the vehicle. A knowledgeable adult must accompany the entry if the whip is less than 14 years of age as of 1/1/2019. A groom may also ride on the carriage with the knowledgeable adult but no other passengers are allowed. Stallions are PROHIBITED in the Junior Division.
- 25. In all classes the driver will wear a hat, apron or knee rug and gloves. An appropriate driving whip should be carried at all times while driving and the whip thong must be able to reach the farthest horse/pony. Failure to carry a whip in a cones or obstacle class incurs ELIMINATION unless accommodations have been approved prior to the class.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS (continued)

- 26. Para/COOL/SN drivers must submit their restrictions and accommodations to the Show Management with their entry by the entry due date of Monday the 5th of August 2019.
- **27.** Drivers may be either an amateur or a professional. The only person to handle the reins, whip and brake is the driver unless under emergency circumstances where assistance may be given without penalty by the grooms or passengers who may dismount for this purpose.
- **28.** In the event of a breakdown in the obstacle classes to harness or vehicle, the competitor is to make only those adjustments necessary for the safe removal of their turnout from the obstacle course.
- 29. No person, horse or pony may appear twice in the same class or over the same diagrammed course except in the Red Light/Green Light Class or in the occasion where they first show as a single or pair and are then shown as a pair or four, or if approved by the TD. In the case of an accident the TD or Show Manager may require a safety inspection of the vehicle involved in the accident by members of the Competition Committee before allowing the vehicle to be used in succeeding classes.
- **30.** Dogs are not allowed to run alongside, behind or under a vehicle during competition, may not be tied or in any way attached to the vehicle, and must be on a leash at all times while on the show grounds.
- **31.** Minors who do not hold a valid driver's license will not be permitted to operate a motorized vehicle or golf cart on the competition grounds.

BORDER CROSSING FROM USA TO CANADA

Reviewed with Canadian Border Guards – Phone 1 800 461 9999 and information is current at 25 March 2019. Information for US residents, call 1 877 227 5511. Driver and passengers must have current **US passports or other current and appropriate documentation.** When crossing into Canada the shipper must have for each equine a negative Coggins test that is less than 180 days old (for the duration of the visit). They must also have a Veterinary Certificate for export into Canada for less than 30 days that has been performed by a US certified Veterinarian that certifies the animal is in good health. Some inspectors ask for documentation that shows you are coming to a competition. We suggest bringing the prize list or copy of your entry.

To go through Canadian Customs the driver should enter through the Commercial Lanes at the border and show their papers to the inspectors there. Please be sure papers are in order. The driver can bring into Canada sufficient bedding and feed for the duration of the animal's visit.

Apron	A cloth worn to keep the wearer clean, dry & warm while driving
Blinkers	Leather covered metal plates attached to the cheek pieces of the bridle to prevent the horse from seeing behind. Also known as blinders and in England as winkers, they can be one of several shapes, but as with other pieces of harness must fit properly
Box	The seat from which the driving is done
Breeching	The harness by which the horse holds back the vehicle when there is no brake
Cart	Generally named after the region from which it came, or the builder, or the purpose it is used for. They can be either two-wheeled or four-wheeled, however they are always open and simpler than the open carriages
Collar	The padded harness that goes around the horse's neck accommodating the harness to which the traces are attached
Crupper	The harness piece that secures the saddle pad from the rear. The dock (tail) piece runs under the tail and attaches to the saddle through the back-strap
Cut under	A type of vehicle construction allowing an arch into which the wheels can turn
Driving reins	The reins used by the driver to direct the horse or team. Russet leather is preferable as the dye from black reins would come off on hands and gloves
Four-in-hand	A popular term for a four horse team
Gig	A light, rather elegant two-wheeler with a forward facing seat generally for two occupants
Hames	The metal arms fitted to the horse's collar
Leader(s)	The two forward horses in a team, the near-leader being the left hand horse & the off-leader being the right hand horse
Liverpool bit	A curb bit with five degrees of severity, the Liverpool is one of the most popular pleasure driving bits
Long lining	A training exercise to help prepare the horse to be directed by reining from the rear rather than by the usual more immediate reins used for riding
Phaeton	An almost all encompassing term covering a wide range of four-wheeled open carriages designed to be driven from a forward seat. At one time phaetons were in almost every size, shape and function

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

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
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
